Early childhood education professionals are essential to the healthy development of our children. But they can't do it alone. It takes a village to raise a child. Here are some ways for you to support child care in your community.



Five Minute Actions

- Register to Vote: Voting is the best way to make your voice heard!
- Find out who represents you at the local, state and national level
 - Find a Montana legislator who represents your district <u>here</u>
 - Contact Governor Steve Bullock <u>here</u>
- Complete the 2020 Census: Make sure to count all children in your household. Our kids miss out on important federal funding when they are left out of the census.
 Follow the Count all Kids campaign for more resources and information.



Ten Minute Actions

- Share your advocacy interests. Tell some of your friends why childcare and early learning issues matter to you and encourage them to take action, too!
 - Help them register to vote and find their representatives!
- Gather some community facts and data about child care to strengthen your message

- VOTE! Learn where candidates stand on important child care issues and cast your vote in primary. midterm, and general elections.
- Keep exploring! Volunteering, fundraising, and educating our communities are all important ways to make a positive change for early childhood.
