# CHILD CARE CONNECTIONS' 2020 HIGHLIGHTS

You hear it everywhere – child care is a key factor in workforce recovery and development and attracting high-paying jobs into our communities. Our mission at Child Care Connections is to improve the quality of child care. We know from our work that quality is irrevocably tied to accessibility and affordability and will continue to work for an early childhood system that provides quality child care that is accessible and affordable for all families.

2020 was a year marked by our response to the pandemic. Much of the work we began in 2020 has enabled us to respond effectively to the pandemic's unique challenges. From leading emergency child care efforts as active members of area disaster relief coalitions to creating stories that help children understand facemasks to reducing stress on essential workers by finding care for their children, we ensured all six counties served by CCC received our support.

All of this work was made possible through our collaboration with an extraordinary group of partners and funders; we are deeply grateful for their continued support, which has given us the flexibility to adapt to the changes around us.

Yet even as we celebrated the success of our response to the pandemic, we had to acknowledge that accessible and affordable quality child care has a long way to go and families continue to face significant disparities in their access to quality child care. To further addresses this over the next year we are redoubling our efforts to make sure that the voices of child care providers and families with young children are heard as Montanans grapple with the economic impacts from the lack of child care. We are working closely with and are launching new relationships with child care providers, families, community organizations, cities, counties, and state government to help us build a better early childhood system for all of Montana's families. These partnerships will help us during the upcoming legislative session to encourage public policy that focuses on delivering the support for quality and affordability that families need.

We are proud of all the accomplishments detailed in our 2020 Annual Report that follows. But today's global crisis has made it clear that much remains to be done to realize our vision of ensuring that families and children have access to foundational early care that is essential for the lifelong success of our children.


This program is fully funded by community support and offers free resource and education around bike and vehicle safety. Impacted by the pandemic, CCC offered these services on a limited basis.
